Barbara A. Gannon Food Pantry News



Dues Assessments

The first quarter payment for 2025 dues is due on January 1st. A late fee of \$15 will be added to your account on the 1st of each month if dues are not paid on time. Association dues assessments are payable on or before the first day of a given quarter. To ensure that your dues payments are posted correctly, your payment must be accompanied by a dues coupon containing all of the required information. Be sure your information is legible. Payments may be sent to the Clubhouse by mail, brought to the Treasurer's office or placed in the dues box on the main floor of the Clubhouse. Dues coupons are available at the Clubhouse and are published in The Sentinel.

As a homeowner, your obligation to pay dues continues as long as you own your home and it is the homeowner's obligation to pay dues for renters. Individuals residing in your home with you on a permanent basis ("permanent" defined as a stay of more than 90 days) must be 19 years of age or older and are obligated to abide by the Association's governing documents. Also, remember, if you own more than one home, each property is subject to dues.

What is Hanukkah?

Hanukkah is the Hebrew word for "dedication." Also known as the Festival of Lights, Hanukkah is an eight-day Jewish holiday celebrating the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem that happened in the second century BC. Dates of Hanukkah are December 25th ~ January 2nd.

What is the background of Hanukkah?

Hanukkah is tied to a time when Israel was struggling for existence. In 167 BC, Israel was under the rule of Antiochus Epiphanes (Greek for "God Manifest"), who was known for his cruelty and delusions of deity. His enemies mockingly referred to him as Antiochus *Epimanes* ("madman").

Among many atrocities he committed to Hellenize Israel, Antiochus desecrated the Temple in Jerusalem, dedicating it to Greek gods and even sacrificing a pig on the altar.

The apocryphal books 1 and 2 Maccabees describe Israel's plight under Antiochus' mad rule, as well as the successful revolt against Antiochus led by the Maccabees, a Jewish family of priests. After winning their freedom, the Jewish people rededicated the Temple to God.

According to Jewish tradition, when the Temple was rededicated, there was only enough pure olive oil to light the Temple menorah for one day. As the story goes, the oil miraculously lasted eight days, long enough to purify more oil.

What Is a Dreidel?

A dreidel is a four-sided top. Under Greek rule, Torahstudy was forbidden. To disguise their studies, Israelites would pretend to be playing dreidel games if anyone came by. Today, the dreidel bears Hebrew letters representing the phrase, "Nes Gadol Hayah Sham (a great miracle happened there)," in reference to Hanukkah.

How is Hanukkah celebrated today?

Today, in remembrance of God's provision, Jewish people light the eight candles on the nine-candle menorah (the ninth candle, the *shammash*, is used to light the others). A new candle is lit on each night of Hanukkah, one candle for each day the oil burned. The candle lighting is often accompanied by readings of Psalms 113–118 and Numbers 7:1–8:4. Families also play games, exchange gifts, share meals, and attend plays and concerts at synagogues and schools.

What are traditional Hanukkah foods?

Since the legend of the miraculously burning oil is a central focus of Hanukkah, it is traditional to eat foods fried in oil during this festival. Eastern-European latkes (potato pancakes) are a popular choice for many; in Israel, sufganiyot (jelly-filled doughnuts) are a favorite.



What is Hanukkah's significance to believers?

Hanukkah is a testament to God's faithfulness to the Jewish people by preserving them through war and persecution – and His faithfulness in fulfilling His promises to produce a Messiah from the line of David. If the Jewish people had succumbed to Hellenizing pressures and lost their religious and ethnic distinctness, the Messianic prophecies could not have been fulfilled.

For believers in Jesus, Hanukkah reminds us of two important points. First, it is a sobering reminder of the force of antisemitism (hatred of Jewish people) in the world. As believers, we should emulate God's love and concern for His chosen people by standing against antisemitism.

Second, Hanukkah reminds us of God's faithfulness – past, present, and future – to His church. Similar to Jewish history, church history has been marked by periods of intense persecution, yet God has continued to bless the spread of faith in Jesus throughout the earth, preserving the church since its birth.



'Twas the night before Christmas, when all through the house, Not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse; The stockings were hung by the chimney with care, In hopes that St. Nicholas soon would be there; The children were nestled all snug in their beds, While visions of sugar-plums danced in their heads; And mamma in her 'kerchief, and I in my cap, Had just settled our brains for a long winter's nap, When out on the lawn there arose such a clatter, I sprang from the bed to see what was the matter. Away to the window I flew like a flash, Tore open the shutters and threw up the sash. The moon on the breast of the new-fallen snow Gave the lustre of mid-day to objects below, When, what to my wondering eyes should appear, But a miniature sleigh, and eight tiny reindeer, With a little old driver, so lively and quick, I knew in a moment it must be St. Nick. More rapid than eagles his coursers they came, And he whistled, and shouted, and called them by name;

"Now, Dasher! now, Dancer! now, Prancer and Vixen! On, Comet! on, Cupid! on, Donder and Blitzen! To the top of the porch! to the top of the wall! Now dash away! dash away! dash away all!" As dry leaves that before the wild hurricane fly, When they meet with an obstacle, mount to the sky; So up to the house-top the coursers they flew, With the sleigh full of Toys, and St. Nicholas too. And then, in a twinkling, I heard on the roof The prancing and pawing of each little hoof. As I drew in my head, and was turning around, Down the chimney St. Nicholas came with a bound. He was dressed all in fur, from his head to his foot, And his clothes were all tarnished with ashes and soot; A bundle of Toys he had flung on his back,



And he looked like a pedler just opening his pack. His eyes—how they twinkled! his dimples how merry! His cheeks were like roses, his nose like a cherry! His droll little mouth was drawn up like a bow And the beard of his chin was as white as the snow; The stump of a pipe he held tight in his teeth, And the smoke it encircled his head like a wreath; He had a broad face and a little round belly, That shook when he laughed, like a bowlful of jelly. He was chubby and plump, a right jolly old elf, And I laughed when I saw him, in spite of myself; A wink of his eye and a twist of his head, Soon gave me to know I had nothing to dread; He spoke not a word, but went straight to his work, And filled all the stockings; then turned with a jerk, And laying his finger aside of his nose, And giving a nod, up the chimney he rose; He sprang to his sleigh, to his team gave a whistle, And away they all flew like the down of a thistle, But I heard him exclaim, ere he drove out of sight, "Happy Christmas to all, and to all a good-night."

About this Poem:

On December 23, 1823, a poem called "A Visit from Saint Nicholas" was published anonymously in the Sentinel, the local newspaper of Troy, New York. This piece offered a different take on Santa Claus, a figure who was, until that time, traditionally depicted as a thinner, less jolly, horse-riding disciplinarian, a combination of mythologies about the British Father Christmas, the Dutch Sinterklaas, and the fourthcentury bishop Saint Nicholas of Myra. But the poem in the newspaper painted a different picture: it gave Santa eight reindeer, and even named them; it described a Santa who could magically sneak in and out of homes via chimneys; and it created the venerated, cheerful, chubby icon that is everpresent in holiday cards, movies, television shows, and malls everywhere. \The poem, of course, is now known as "'Twas the Night Before Christmas," after its famous first line. Thirteen years after it was published, Clement Clark Moore took credit for its authorship, though his claim to the poem is now in question. Many believe the poem was actually penned by New York writer Henry Livingston.

Vice President Report:

Trees – We have spent 45K on the trimming and removal of trees, tree limbs and dead branches. Based on our guidelines we only cut down trees that at dead or dying. If you see a dead tree in the common area, please call the office and we will set up a time to come out and remove it. We do not remove trees that are still living. The balance of the funds left for trees will be left in reserve in case of emergencies. There is a list of trees that need to come down. Someone will call about a tree, Rich will go out and take a look and then take our Tree Specialist out to check it again, if it is dead then it will be removed.

Clubhouse Security – The only company who has come back with a bid was ADT as they are the only company who does commercial buildings. ADT's bid was around \$1900 to install and \$50 per month monitoring. Will be working to get a few more quotes and will circle back.

Secretary's Report:

New Sentinel Guidelines – Guidelines will be presented to the clubs at our 12/6 meeting. These will be guidelines for dates and times that flyers, blurbs, from the desk of and anything else you would like to see in the Sentinel.

NexTrex Recycling Challenge – 1000 lbs of plastic will be able to get new benches. Flyers are in the Sentinel and our old Garbage Cans are eligible for this program. Contact Vicki Kohanek for bags and questions.

Treasurer's report

Treasurer's report: We had cash \$589,605 for increase \$4,337 net increase. With the help of Esther we have been sending out notices to delinquent residents. Dues collections of \$20,089. YTD \$246,300 ahead of the budget by \$38,300. Salary and Benefits are \$49K is ahead of budget by \$4K due to reduction of hours when he continued with Summer Hours. Transfer fees of \$13,700 for the month and YTD \$64,400 those funds go to our Capital Reserve Study. – Motion Susan, 2nd Esther 2nd - vote 10-0.

2025 Budget Update – Officers will meet this week to go over the budget and to add the items they would like to see included for 2025. Budget will be in the Sentinel and will be mailed to every home in SRPW. It will be voted on by the Board of Trustees at the December 9th Meeting. Homeowners do not vote on the budget.

Healthy Hop is a free transportation service in Monmouth and Ocean County, NJ, designed to help seniors aged 60 years and older get to their medical appointments without any stress or worry.


We understand that many seniors have difficulty accessing reliable transportation, which is why we have partnered with the local Offices on Aging to provide this service.

With our service, seniors can simply call us when they are ready to go, and we will arrange for an Uber, Lyft, or local taxi service to pick them up and take them to their appointment. No need to book ahead or worry about transportation logistics. We'll take care of everything for you!

To use our service, seniors must register by filling out a brief application. This ensures that we have all the necessary information to provide a safe and efficient transport.

Ways to Register

- 1. Call our office at: 732-505-2273. Please plan to be on the phone for 15-20 minutes.
- 2. Fill out a paper application and mail to Caregiver address listed below.
- 3. Fill out an application online on our website at cvcj.org/healthyhop.



Eligibility and Limits

- 60 years or over
- Live in Monmouth or Ocean County
- Must be able to get in and out of the car with only gentle assistance. Canes and Walkers can be accommodated; however Wheelchairs cannot.
- Registration with Caregiver Volunteers is required before requesting a ride
- Only one round trip per week can be requested
- Rides can be dispatched to local medical appointments only. This includes lab work, physical therapy, and procedures that do not require anesthesia.

Getting Rides

- 1. Once your registration has been processed, you will receive a postcard like this one. Please save it, as it will contain all the information you need to call for a ride.
- 2. When you are at your pick-up location, call the office for your ride. Drivers have a 3-minute wait time before a ride is considered canceled.
- 3. As part of your benefits, you are eligible to one local weekly round trip ride for medical appointments, such as physical therapy, lab tests, and non-anesthesia procedures.
- 4. Return trips must be called into the office before 2:30 pm in Ocean County and 3:30 pm in Monmouth County.

PARKING ON LAWNS

CLUBHOUSE PARKING

Parking in the Clubhouse parking lot while away on a trip is limited to members only. When an Association member plans to leave a car in the Clubhouse parking lot while away on a trip, the office must be advised and provided with dates of trip, license plate number, make of car and proof of insurance. All vehicles left in the parking lot must be parked in the parking spaces nearest Westbrook Drive. Non-association members are not permitted to leave their cars in the parking lot while away on a trip. This, of course, applies to trips only and does not apply to non-association members who are attending events at the Clubhouse.

CLUBHOUSE USE

The Clubhouse is available for use by sanctioned clubs and committees for their events and meetings. The Berkeley Township EMS is a paid service and accepts, as full payment, the payment provided by your health insurance.

GARAGE/YARD SALES

Residents may hold garage or yard sales only within the confines of resident's own garage or driveway and are limited to two (2) per year. No "Garage Sale," or "Yard Sale," advertisements are to be posted on utility poles or township signs and all signs must be removed immediately after the event. Note: Before holding a garage or yard sale, you must register it with the Township Clerk's Office; this is a Berkeley Township ordinance.

EXTERIOR PROPERTY **IMPROVEMENT**

All changes to your property that are visible to the exterior must be approved by the Architectural Control Committee of the Association before work can commence. You will need Architectural Control approval before you can obtain Berkeley Township permits where permits are required. PET OWNERSHIP – SRPWHOA REQUIREMENTS

Silver Ridge Park West Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions, Article VIII (K): Dogs, cats and other household pets may be kept as long as they are not bred for a commercial purpose and are restricted to the homeowner's lot or living unit unless they are on a leash. Ownership of pets is subject to Berkeley Township ordinances. IN SRPW, A MAXIMUM OF THREE HOUSEHOLD PETS IS PERMITTED.

IMPORTANT NOTICES

PET OWNERSHIP AND WILDLIFE BERKELEY TOWNSHIP REQUIREMENTS Domestic pets

Berkeley Township requires the licensing of every dog and cat. The license period runs from January to January and must be renewed every year. There is a minimum \$25.00 fine for failure to license.

Dogs:

Dog owners are prohibited from allowing their dogs to soil any lawn or property of any person other than the person who owns or has custody of the dog.

Dog owners may not keep a dog that habitually barks, cries or howls between the hours of 10 pm and 6 am. Dog owners must keep a dog on a leash not more than 6 feet long.

A fine of \$500 can be assessed for violation of these provisions. Go to this link for more detail on the Berkeley Township requirements for dog ownership. https://ecode360.com/35651810

Cats:

Do not feed a stray cat unless you ensure that it is spayed/neutered and inoculated for rabies. The Township can assess fines up to \$500 for violation of this provision.

Your cat must remain on your property and may not cause a nuisance to other residents.

Wildlife:

Berkeley Township prohibits the feeding of wildlife, including geese and ducks. Birds are the only wildlife that homeowners can feed as long as proper bird feeders are used.

CONCERNS OR OUESTIONS?

Use the Question, Suggestion, Information Form contained in the Sentinel whenever you have a concern. You can mail it to the office or drop it in the door slot. Your concern will be addressed at a monthly open session of the Board of Trustees. If you need an immediate response, contact your section trustee. You will find that contact information on p. 3. If your trustee cannot answer your question, he or she will then bring your concern to the Board of Trustees at a monthly open session.

Fire Extinguishers

Berkeley Township Requirements for all resale & rental properties

- 1. Rated ABC Type 2A:10B:C
- 2. Must be mounted and visible within 10 feet of the kitchen. Fire extinguisher can't be blocked by furniture, storage or other items, and cannot be placed inside enclosed areas. It must be accompanied by an owner's manual.
- 3. The top of the fire extinguisher cannot be higher than five (5) feet above the floor.
- 4. Fire extinguisher must be near a room exit or travel way that provides an escape route to the exterior.

Fire Pits

Wood Fire Pit Requirements – As open burning of any kind without a permit is prohibited, commercially purchased fire pits for residential usage only, are permitted if the following requirements are satisfied. Total fuel area must be less than 36 inches in width. length or diameter and not more than 24 inches in height, the fire pit must have legs and is off the ground and the fire pit is covered with a mandatory ember/ spark screen. The ember/spark screen is required to be in place at all times during the usage of the fire pit. The location of the fire pit shall be away from all combustible materials. Fire pit usage is prohibited when the NJFFS has issued a "Red Flag Warning". The burning of paper, leaves or other waste vegetation is also prohibited. Any type of fire pit, commercial or homemade, not meeting the stated requirements is considered "Open Burning" and thereby prohibited from usage, unless a permit is applied for and issued.

Dues Coupons

Effective January 1, 2025, homeowners dues are \$72 per quarter per living unit. Payments are to be made at the beginning of the quarter or the beginning of January and July, if paid annually or semi-annually. 



Berkeley Township Construction Permits

No construction permit shall be issued for the alteration of the exterior of any residence or addition to such residence, or construction of accessory structures located within any planned residential retirement community, unless the application for such permit is accompanied by a written statement issued by the association organized under subsection 35-101.12 of this section, indicating whether the association has approved the proposed improvement. In the absence of such approval the Construction Official may if otherwise required to issue the permit pursuant to the Uniform Construction Code note on the permit that the applicant must obtain such approval before beginning construction.





In this technological era where everyone spends 90% of their time on the phone, I think I have come up with a few new resolutions to replace the old ones.

I'm going to spend less time playing games on my phone

I'm going to spend less time making Tik-Tok Videos

I'm going to watch less Podcasts

Device free dinner (all phones are collected before dinner and returned after - even work calls can wait an hour.)

Spend less time texting your kids and more time talking to them

History of New Year's Resolutions1

Don't get too bummed out but the concept of a New Year's resolution doesn't have a single historical origin. However, there are a few major turning points for this cultural tradition.

- 1. New Year's Resolutions likely started in the Springtime. 4000 years ago in Mesopotamia, life revolved around agriculture. The beginning of the calendar started in the March/April time frame when the crops started to grow. This symbolized a new beginning and was paired with the Babylonian Akitu Festival. Citizens would make promises to the gods for the new year and use this as a moment to return borrowed tools, supplies and equipment. They lived in a more trade-based economy, so this was a good moment to reset. If you kept your promise (New Year's Resolution) to the gods, it was said that good fortune would fall upon you.
- 2. 46 BC Julis Caesar established January 1st as New Year's Day. Without communication technology, people across the Roman Empire didn't know what day it was. This made it difficult to plan events and really anything at all. The further and further one got from the center of a city, the less likely they would know what day it was. Julius Caesar established January 1st as the beginning of the year to solve this problem. This calendar would be called the Julian calendar. The name January comes from the god Janus the god of new beginnings. Janice was often Illustrated with two faces, one face looking into the future and one face looking into the past. On January 1st, government officials would make promises to the emperor himself to show loyalty. The courts would close for half a day and New Year's Day was considered a holiday.
- 3. The Ball Drops in Times Square for the first time in 1907. Millions of people watch the ball drop and many use this moment to mark the beginning of their New Year's Resolution. But why a ball and what is the meaning behind it? This tradition comes from ancient sailing. Sailors needed to know what time it was but their timekeeping methods aboard the ships were primitive. To solve this problem, there would be a giant ball at the port that could be seen from the sea. This ball would drop at the same time every day (usually 1pm) to help sailors reset their understanding of time.

In some ways, the mark of a new year is arbitrary. What is the practical difference of starting a goal on January 1st versus August 12th? Holidays are a man-made construct; however, we at *because I said I would* are grateful for the holiday of New Year's Day. Something has to wake us up and remind us of the importance of our goals and the shortness of life. If that reminder comes with an arbitrary day and an arbitrary ball, we'll take it. Because what is not arbitrary is your life and how you spend it. Anything that reminds us of that is a good thing.

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

Property Tax Deductions

A deduction of \$250 is available to those residents age 65 years of age or older, who have owned their homes since October first of the previous tax year, lived in the state for two years and whose income (excluding Social Security or other similar government pension) does not exceed \$10,000.
